

You don't need a home to be a voter!

Information for homeless & unstably housed voters in Washington state in 2021

Tips for filling out a voter registration form:

Your residential address is the place you spend most of your time. You can list the address of a shelter, park, or intersection, as long as it is identifiable on a map. Make sure to fill out city and ZIP code. Example: 45th St & 15th Ave, Seattle WA 98105

Your mailing address is the place you will receive your ballot. You can use an address where you already get mail, a P.O. box, address of a friend or relative, shelter, or a mail service at a day center or food bank.

You can register to vote if:

You are a **United States citizen;**

You have lived in WA state for more than 30 days by Election Day;

You are 18 years or older by Election Day;

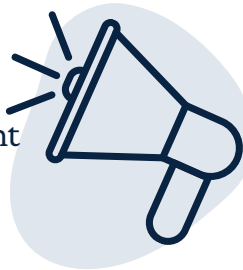
You are not on Department of Corrections custody for a Washington state felony conviction. See below for changes to this law beginning 2022 or visit freethevotewa.org

Changes to who is eligible are coming

Beginning 2022, people will have their voting rights restored immediately after leaving prison. Any citizen who is not incarcerated will be able to vote. That right will not be able to be revoked because of court debt.
